Christmas Break | No Classes


The **2023 Christmas break** will last **from Saturday, December 23, 2023 until Sunday, January 7, 2024**.

TOPIC WEEK 2023



Queer Perseverance? Exploring the Kaleidoscope of LGBTQIA+ Representation & Expression



The organizing committee thanks all participants, speakers, and lecturers for a great **Topic Week 2023**. Overall, we are delighted with the numbers of attendants and the productive discussions and conversations during and after the events. The **great turnout** of faculty members and other participants alike affirmed the importance and interest surrounding this year's chosen topic of **Queer Perseverance**.

In the following, we can only highlight a few of the many exciting lectures, screenings, seminar sessions, and the craft session that took place.

The first special event of this Topic Week was the **Zoom lecture** with [**Professor Anna Wilson**](#). Her online talk, which focused on approaches to queerness in cultural productions in which queerness was not a concept yet, was an insightful start into this week. Prof. Wilson introduced the listeners to a variety of premodern texts and demonstrated how they can be studied through a queer lens to understand their explorations of gender and sexuality. The lecture illustrated the **manifold shapes and forms** queer representation has taken on through the ages, how they have persevered and how we can learn to uncover them.

The talk of [**Dr. Lena Mattheis**](#) at the **LitCult Colloquium** introduced the audience to the **literary history of pronouns**, as well as gendered questions of narration and characterization in storytelling. The talk also sparked a discussion about pronoun use with several participants sharing their experiences and perspectives. Dr. Mattheis beautifully created a setting where both academic inquiry of looking into the past in unusual places as well as meaningful debates about personal stories and day-to-day issues were encouraged and valued alike.

[**Professor Lemke**](#)'s insightful sessions on **Moonlight** alongside the **screening** of **The Man with the Answers** (in collaboration with the [**aka-Filmclub**](#)) ignited vibrant discussions about the essence of queer cinema and the art of authentic representation. These seminars delved into a spectrum of thought-provoking topics, ranging from the complexities of intersectionality to the nuances of gatekeeping within the queer community.

Additionally, we hosted an engaging **panel discussion** [**Stories We Tell Ourselves To Live**](#) featuring [**Dr. Lena Mattheis**](#) and [**Dr. Jan Wilm**](#) on queer studies and literature. Dr. Mattheis (researcher and podcast

host) and Dr. Wilm (writer and translator) as agents of queer literature shared their own picks of stories that have been especially meaningful to them and celebrated the **milestones queer literature has achieved** over the past decades, but also critically examined the gaps that remain. Using an interactive feedback app, the audience participated in curating a collection of everyone's favorite queer stories, which we will also post on the website of the English Department. [**Jos Fritz**](#) Buchhandlung kindly provided us with a selection of queer literature for this event and the audience was able to shop new books inspired by the panel discussion.

Alongside the academic events, we also teamed up with the [**Regenbogen-Referat**](#) for an afternoon dedicated to providing a more informal space to gather. Open to all, the [**Queer Crafting**](#) event brought about a myriad of Christmas decorations, hand-made jewelry, paintings, pronoun buttons, and other beautiful artworks as well as wonderful opportunities to relax, socialize and reflect on the Topic Week and queer life together in a safe space.

The topic of [**Queer Perseverance**](#) will remain relevant to the students and staff of the English Department and we are certain that the impact of this week will continue to be felt in the future.

This is why the English department plans on [**continuing the concept of an annual Topic Week**](#) with various topics regarding our contemporary society and struggles that might be faced by certain groups or all of us together. Stay tuned for upcoming events and more!

Auch im Monat November erreichten das Englische Seminar wieder erfreuliche Nachrichten:

- **ERC Consolidator Grant für Prof. Dr. Eva von Contzen**

Die Anglistin **Prof. Dr. Eva von Contzen** erhält ein Consolidator Grant des Europäischen Forschungsrats (ERC), womit die Europäische Union ihr Forschungsprojekt zur Erzählform des retelling fördert. Die Auszeichnung gehört zu den renommiertesten Preisen für Wissenschaftler:innen in der EU. Die Förderung läuft über fünf Jahre und beträgt je zwei Millionen Euro. Von europaweit gut 2.000 eingereichten Anträgen fördert der ERC in diesem Jahr 308.

The main objective of the program is to study **various cultures and regions within the social sciences**, focusing on the Global South. The GSP is conducted jointly by the University of Freiburg (Germany), the University of Cape Town (South Africa), Jawaharlal Nehru University (New Delhi, India), FLACSO Argentina (Buenos Aires) and Chulalongkorn University (Bangkok).

Within the GSP, students learn to approach the world and globalization from various regional perspectives and disciplines, comprising sociology, political sciences, anthropology, and cultural geography. The program's global and multicultural experience is enhanced by the diversity of its students who study at different places around the world together. Each group comprises students from all parts of the world.



Indigenous Reads | Eric Gansworth, *Apple / Skin to the Core* (2020)

Indigenous Reads is a literature colloquium dedicated to very contemporary literature by Indigenous writers from Turtle Island. We meet monthly to discuss the texts and their socio-historical implications. The setting is friendly and informal; it resembles a book club more than a university course. We gather students, staff, and local guests, the only requirement being to read the books.



In January, the group will discuss **Eric Gansworth's *Apple / Skin to the Core*** (2020).

Eric Gansworth tells the story of his life, of an Onondaga family living among Tuscaroras, and of Native people in America, including the damaging legacy of government boarding schools—and in doing so grapples with the slur common in Native communities, for someone “red on the outside, white on the inside,” and reclaims it.



Contemporary Literature Book Club | Lindsey Drager, *The Archive of Alternate Endings* (2019)

The **Contemporary Literature Book Club** is a meeting group intended for the discussion of contemporary literature in the English language. Students, faculty, and staff are always welcome to join us.

This month, the group will discuss **Lindsey Drager's *The Archive of Alternate Endings* (2019)**.

In 1456, Johannes Gutenberg's sister uses the tale as a surrogate for sharing a family secret only her brother believes. In 1835, The Brothers Jacob and Wilhelm Grimm revise the tale to bury a truth about Jacob even he can't come to face. In 1986, a folklore scholar and her brother come to find the record is wrong about the figurative witch in the woods, while in 2211, twin space probes aiming to find earth's sister planet disseminate the narrative in binary code. Breadcrumbs back in time from 2365 to 1378, siblings reimagine, reinvent, and recycle the narrative of Hansel and Gretel to articulate personal, regional, and ultimately cosmic experiences of tragedy.

Reading Games | *Signalis* (2022)

Reading Games (as in "we are reading games," not as if a series of gamified reading sessions) is a book club for video games instead of books.

The club meets (currently online) on a monthly basis to talk about **selected games**, from an **interdisciplinary perspective**, including Cultural Studies and literary approaches. In order to join, you don't have to have any level of knowledge of video games, or define yourself as a "gamer." That term is becoming as meaningful as a term like "movie-goer," in today's world, where digital games are everywhere as cultural products.



In December, the club will continue their theme **Spooky** by discussing **Signalis (2022)**.

A classic survival horror experience with a unique aesthetic, full of melancholic mystery. Explore a world with a dark secret, solve puzzles, fight off nightmarish creatures and navigate through dystopian, surreal worlds as Elster, a technician Replika looking for a lost dream.

The **selected reading** for this theme is: **Rodriguez et al., Mental Health, Atmospheres, Video Games: New Directions in Game Research II** (2022).

This book is recommended to participants who want to engage with the selected games on a more critical level. The text will be referred to in the discussions, but reading is optional. The book is available as a free open access copy in pdf and epub formats on the [publisher's website](#).
